

Hosta
'Fragrant Bouquet'

Ht: 20-24 in Spread: 24-30 in
Partial Sun-Full Shade
Mounds of apple green foliage with wide, light yellow margins and stalks of fragrant flowers. Prefers a rich, moist, well-drained soil in part shade. Attracts Wildlife, Hummingbirds & Butterflies



Hosta 'Blue Mouse Ears'

Height: 6-8 in Spread: 12 in
Partial to full shade
An award winning and fun hosta, 'Blue Mouse Ears' adds a bit of whimsy to any shade garden. Its cute, heart shaped leaves rarely reach over 3 inches long and each clump makes a perfectly symmetrical mound of extremely thick, almost rubbery blue leaves, each one having a sliver of white around the edge. Spikes of lavender blooms pop up on long stems held above the foliage in late July. It is one of the most slug resistant varieties available.



Hosta 'Kiwi Full Monty'

Ht: 20-24 in Spread: 24-30 in
Big, corrugated foliage features a bright yellow leaf center and a wide, dreamy, blue-green margin creating a color contrast sensation that will perk up any shaded or partial sun location. It is a rounded, well behaved Hosta with great form and great color. It provides a nice full scape of lavender blue flowers in July that will attract your eye and local butterflies and hummingbirds!



Astilbe chinensis
'Visions in White'

Height: 16" - 20" Width: 20" - 26"
Part Sun/Shade Full Shade
Same habit and vigor as 'Visions' but with deeper green foliage and bright green buds opening to soft white plumes. Not Favored by Deer, Good for Wet Spots, and Cutflowers



Astilbe x 'Younique
Silvery Pink'

Height: 16" - 20" Width: 16" - 20"
Part Sun/Shade Full Shade
Large fluffy spikes of pastel pink in late spring, very heavy flowering (even if its first year), compact habit. Not Favored by Deer, Good for Wet Spots and Cutflowers



Watering Tomato Plants

Proper watering plays a significant role in producing a healthy tomato plant with tasty, meaty, juicy fruit. So, what's the secret?


ROOTS Always water at the root zone; never overhead water your tomato plant. Watering directly at the soil level will strengthen the plant's root system. When you overhead water, much of the water will not make it to the roots as it evaporates before reaching the soil. Water droplets on plant leaves act as a magnifying glass and can burn tender plant tissue. Water dripping from leaf to leaf can cause the spread of disease.

SLOWLY Allow the water to drip slowly into the soil giving the plant roots time to absorb the moisture. A drip system is best. Avoid using a hand held hose, as it is easy to underwater using this method. Water to a depth of 8 inches.

REGULARLY Water consistently to produce larger fruits and to avoid split and cracked fruit and blossom end rot. Tomato plants should be watered 2 to 3 times a week in the height of summer. A deep soaking rain counts.

PLANT WITH CONFIDENCE THIS SUMMER

We are all busy, that means we need to plant when we have the time. I can tell you that I'm lucky if I have plants in by July...

There is a popular misconception that the only time of year to plant is spring. Summer is an excellent time of year for planting new garden areas. Most trees, shrubs and perennials can be successfully planted right through the summer and into early autumn. The warmth of the soil promotes rapid root growth and quickly establishes your new planting.

The most important factor for successful summer planting is the selection of the right plant material, that's where we can help. Trees, shrubs and perennials should be either container grown or should have been dug, balled and burlapped in spring to ensure successful summer planting. In the case of container grown stock, the entire root system is enclosed in the pot or container and the plant will suffer very little planting stress when transplanted.

If you are planting a garden in an area with poor soil, it is best to add liberal amounts of organic matter, such as **Purple Cow compost** or peat moss (1 to 2 inches deep) and turn over the soil 6-8 inches down

over the entire garden bed. This improves the entire soil profile and will result in better plant growth.

Water is the key to success in summer gardening. Plants should be thoroughly watered when planted. The plants should then be watered two or three times after planting, allowing the water to soak into the soil between these waterings. The soil around the newly planted stock should not be allowed to totally dry out for 4 to 8 weeks after transplanting. Less frequent but thorough waterings will promote stronger and faster root establishment than a light daily watering. I recommend after the first week of heavier waterings that you deliver a total of about 2- 2 1/2 inches of water per week delivered in 3 installments. It's best to do this in the morning...don't waste water by irrigating during the hot mid-day.

Keeping moisture in the soil will greatly reduce the need and frequency of watering summer planted nursery stock. Removal of any weeds or grass two feet around the plant will reduce the competition for water and mulching this area with **Hampton's Estate mulch**, or **Sweet Peet** will greatly improve the soil's moisture retention ability. Mulching around newly planted stock can reduce watering from a

daily occurrence to a weekly occurrence. So don't rush...you've got all summer...

Summer Care of Hanging Baskets



Hanging baskets can add a fantastic spray of color to an existing landscape. Many people visit garden centers and nurseries in the spring to buy their favorite hanging baskets. With a little care, hanging baskets can last well into the fall. Here are a few tips on caring for your hanging baskets.

Watering - Hanging baskets and containers dry out very quickly. On a warm summer day, you may have to water as much as two or three times.

One way to know if your baskets are dry, is to lift them up from the bottom of the container. Dry baskets will be very light weight and should be watered at once. You may also feel the soil to determine dryness. If the potting soil feels dry one inch below the soil surface, then it must be watered. When you water, be sure to water enough

so that it drains out the drainage holes. If your hanging basket has dried out too much, then you will need to immerse it in a bucket of water to resoak the soil mix.

Fertilizing - Frequent watering flushes nutrients from the soil rather quickly. Frequent fertilizing will help replenish that which is lost.

Liquid fertilizers such as **Purple Cow Compost Tea** are applied biweekly throughout the growing season. They are fast acting. Timed-release fertilizers, such as **Osmacote** are applied to the soil, and are released over time. They can last up to several months, depending on the fertilizer. Before you fertilize, it is important that the soil is moist. Fertilizer is utilized by plants much better when they are turgid and not wilting. Be sure to follow all labeled instructions on fertilizer applied to hanging baskets.

Dead-heading - It is important to remove all faded flowers after they have bloomed. This is known as dead-heading. Removal of spent blooms will promote additional flowers to form. Some plants, such as verbena, benefit from cutting them back in mid summer. This will help promote further branching and flower formation.


